Liberal Education Requirements

LIBERAL EDUCATION AT THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

The University of Minnesota and its faculty are committed to providing students with a liberal education (LE) with courses inviting students to investigate the world, learn new ways of thinking, and grow as an active citizen and lifelong learner. The LE curriculum is designed to be integrated throughout a student's four-year undergraduate experience, giving students a multidisciplinary perspective. Where indicated, certain courses are fulfilled by BSN program requirements. Students must fulfill the remaining requirements through elective coursework, either at the University of Minnesota or transferred from another institution.

WRITING INTENSIVE

The third facet of liberal education at the University of Minnesota is the writing requirement, which has two components:

- First-Year Writing** requirements (WRIT 1301, 1401, or equivalent) are completed within students' first two semesters of registration. First-year writing gives incoming students the fundamental writing skills demanded in university study.

- Writing Intensive** courses help students understand what it means to write in various disciplines.

A total of four writing intensive courses must be taken, and two of the four courses must be completed at the upper-division (3xxx or higher) level, with one of the two upper-division courses must be within a student's major field of study.

DIVERSIFIED CORE

The diversified core guides students through the "why" and "how" of different academic disciplines. These classes equip students with a broad range of tools to approach problems in everyday life and work and ultimately to make a positive difference. Students are required to satisfy all seven core requirements.
